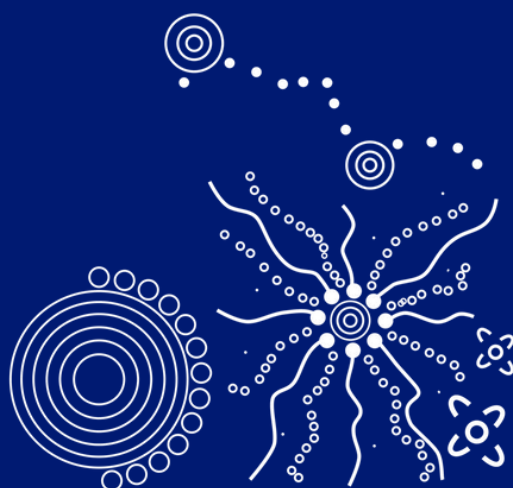


## OUR ARTWORK - "COMING TOGETHER" BY KYRA UGLE

# PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS

Dear Students, Staff, Families, and Community,

As we reach the end of Semester 1, I would like to take a moment to reflect on what has been a remarkable period of learning, growth and achievement at Safety Bay Senior High School. This term has brought significant progress across academic areas, specialist offerings, and student wellbeing initiatives.

From Pathfinders and Thrive to specialist Football and Cheer-Dance programs, our school continues to be a place where every student is supported to reach their full potential.

## **School Review**

As part of our school improvement journey, we undertook a significant milestone this term through the completion of the School Review. This process draws upon perspectives from staff, students, parents, and school board members and provides an opportunity to celebrate the school's growth. However, it also provided an opportunity for us to hear important insights that will help inform the next steps in our school improvement journey. The journey is ongoing (as it should be), it's clear that our direction is positive, and we are well positioned to lead sustainable school improvement.

## **Professional Learning Communities**

Our staff continue to demonstrate exceptional professionalism, dedication and, through our instructional model, our teaching practices are constantly refined. We launched a new framework this term for our Professional Learning Communities that is underpinned by principles from DuFour, and spent time building an understanding of this framework. By prioritising teacher time, we are building strong foundations for our staff to build strong foundations and meaningfully collaborate in cross-curricular groups. We are now ready to embark on our next stage by focusing on Scaffold and Frameworks, with our Pathfinders teachers focusing on metacognition strategies next term.



## Promoting School Attendance

This term saw the introduction of a new school initiative – Attendance Week! This forms part of a bigger strategy to promote the importance of attending school every day. Students were encouraged to partake in a week-long schedule with a new attendance message promoted each day. Our students told us how much this positive and engaging week highlighted the need to attend school every day. In Term 3, we plan to roll-out the '100 Club' that celebrates students who achieve 100% attendance at school. More information will be released soon.

## Building Updates

We are pleased to share that our building works will commence in the October school holidays. The following works will commence:

- Construction of the Sports Hall and Arts Facility.
- Construction of the Administration building.
- Improvements to our Maths block, which will see new ceilings, roofing and air conditioning.

These additions will significantly expand the learning and support spaces available to our students. More information will be provided in Term 3 via Compass and our school newsletter. Please keep an eye out!

As we head into the Semester break, I encourage students and staff to rest, rejuvenate, and reflect, and look forward to seeing everyone return with renewed energy. On Monday 16<sup>th</sup> June, the incredible Alice from our Student Services team came to school with around 20 long braids, and went home BALD!

Alice participated in the **World's Greatest Shave** this year, and at the time of writing this has raised over \$3000 for the Leukaemia Foundation, funds which go towards research and support services for patients and their families affected by blood cancer. Over 150'000 Australians are currently facing the devastating impact of blood cancer and 17 lose their life every single day, so this hairy sacrifice has made a huge difference.

Alice is such an inspiration to us all at Safety Bay Senior High School, allowing students and staff to cut individual braids off before getting her head completely shaved, all to raise money and awareness towards leukaemia.

On Friday 20th June, our **Year 12 Visual Art** students embarked on a memorable excursion to the **Art Gallery of Western Australia** (AGWA). This enriching experience offered a unique opportunity for students to engage directly with original artworks in a professional and curated setting.

During the guided tour, students explored a diverse range of artistic styles, techniques, and mediums. They were encouraged to observe, interpret, and analyse the visual language of each piece, deepening their understanding of how artists communicate ideas and emotions through art. # DRAMA EXCURSION - HOODS



THIS ABSTRACT SET WAS SO SPOOKY

On Wednesday, 4th June, a group of high-achieving Year 9 and 10 Performing Arts (Drama) students went to Koorliny Art Centre in Kwinana to see the play 'Hoods', written by Angela Betzien:

*"Each night, two hoods ride a train to a wrecking yard on the outskirts of the city. Here, in this cemetery of stories, they are storytellers with the power to fast forward, pause and rewind. Tonight, they tell the story of three kids left in a car."*

HOODS powerfully showcases the core elements of Poor Theatre, omniscient narration, physical theatre, and fluid character transitions, creating a dynamic and compelling performance. By adopting a child's perspective, the production introduces moments of levity and insight within a storyline that confronts issues such as poverty, domestic violence, self-harm, and social responsibility. The play aligns with the Drama curriculum through dramatic storytelling and performance styles, thematic exploration of social justice and human rights, and critical analysis and reflection on contemporary issues.





# CURTIN ENGLISH CONFERENCE

On Monday, the 16<sup>th</sup> of June, the Safety Bay SHS ATAR English class headed up to the Curtin English and Literature Conference.

Every year, Curtin University opens its doors to ATAR English students from across the state, offering lectures on different aspects of the English course. These lectures are run by university lecturers, published authors, and some of the people who work on the English syllabus.



These experts gave tips on ways to approach the different sections of the exam that students have already been able to put into practise during English class activities.

The day gave students the opportunity to taste what university life will be like. They also enjoyed tasting the delicious offerings available for lunch, particularly from Milky Lane. The day was very beneficial and enjoyed by all.



# YEAR 9 CAREER TASTERS



Some of our Year 9 students have recently been out to different TAFE campuses to experience a range of Career Taster excursions! Students get to take part in hands-on experiences in different working & learning environments they may be interested in post-school.

The **'Dental Dynamics'** taster involved students having the opportunity to set and shape a denture mould and were able to experience teeth cleaning on dummy patients. Students finished the day by sculpting teeth out of clay.



Most recently, students attended the **'Gore Make-Up/Fashion'** career taster and had the exciting opportunity to sample two different TAFE courses run out of the Northbridge campus. The first activity was to hear about the theatrical make-up and costume design qualification. TAFE is partnering with the new Perth Film Studios being built in Malaga, which opens next year. Students who study this course will be the first to be considered for employment at the studios which is exciting.

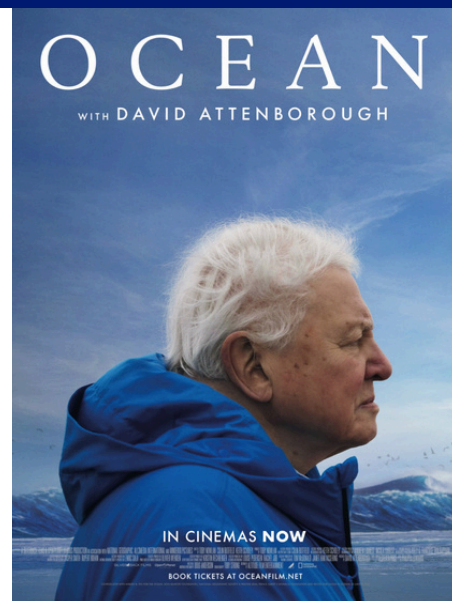

## VET in Schools - TAFE at School Applications (Prospective Industry Link Pathway 2026)

Year 10 and 11 students interested in enrolling in a VET in Schools TAFE course as part of the Industry Links Pathway for 2026 should visit Mrs Edwards or a member of the Pathways Team during Weeks 1 to 4 of Term 3.

TAFE applications must be submitted to a member of the Pathways team within this timeframe, as **enrolments close on Friday, 29th August 2025**. We encourage students to *apply early to avoid missing out*. A current resume and 2 TAFE course preferences are required, so please ensure this is prepared before meeting with Mrs Edwards or the Pathways Team Member.

A **TAFE Application Workshop** will be held on Wednesday, 6 August from 3-4pm in the Library Room 3 for students and their parent/carer. This session will support students in preparing and being ready to submit a strong application.

Please note that acceptance into the Industry Links Pathway is dependent on successfully securing a place in a TAFE course. For more information and to collect application materials, visit the VET & Industry Links Office in H Block.

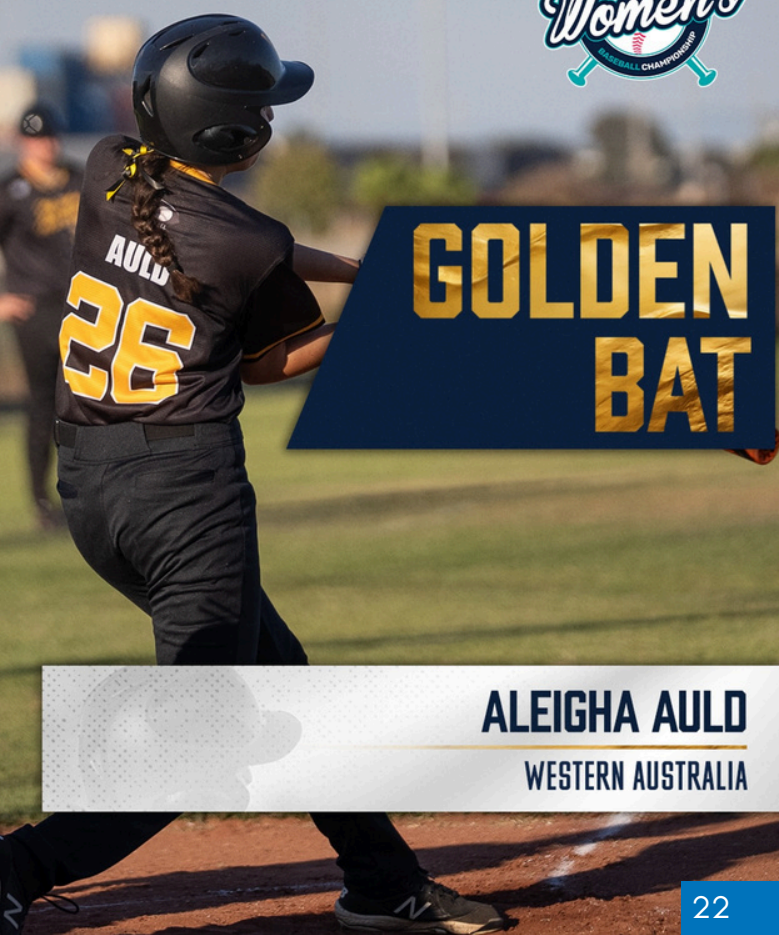
Aleigha has been invited to travel to America this month as part of the Australian National U16 squad - what an achievement!

# School Board - Student Applications

## Our Board is:

- Comprised of staff, parents and members of the community.
- Every public school in Western Australia has a school board.
- Working to ensure that the community expectations and the school's priorities reflect the needs of students.
- The board makes decisions on things like fees and charges, book lists, sponsorships and dress codes.
- Say the school wants to change the dress code and introduce a pink and orange checkered skirt. You know yourself, your friends and other people in the school. You would be able to advise whether people would wear this and if the investment is worth it.

## You must be:

- Fifteen years or older
- Willing to attend after-school meetings and training. The board meets once a term, generally around week 5 or 6, from 5:30pm to 6:30pm.
- Responsible, proactive and wanting to make a difference in and for the school.
- You do not need to be a current student leader to apply.
- Looks good on a resume, university application, etc.

## The Board does not:

- Take part in the day-to-day running of the school.
- Discuss individual teachers, staff, students, or parents.
- Exercise authority over teachers.

## Nominations close:

- The board has two available spots.
- When applying, you will be asked to supply a candidate profile. Here you can write a little something about yourself, your interest in the board and any expertise you believe you can bring.
- Being a current student is enough. However, if you're a part of a sports team, part-time workplace, babysit, etc., these show maturity and capability.
- If we get more than two applicants for the school board, the applicants will be put to a vote using the candidate profile. Every student in the school can and should vote for the person they think would be the best representative for the school. More information around this will be released should this occur.
- Applicants will also be vetted by your teachers to make sure they believe they'd be a good fit for the board.

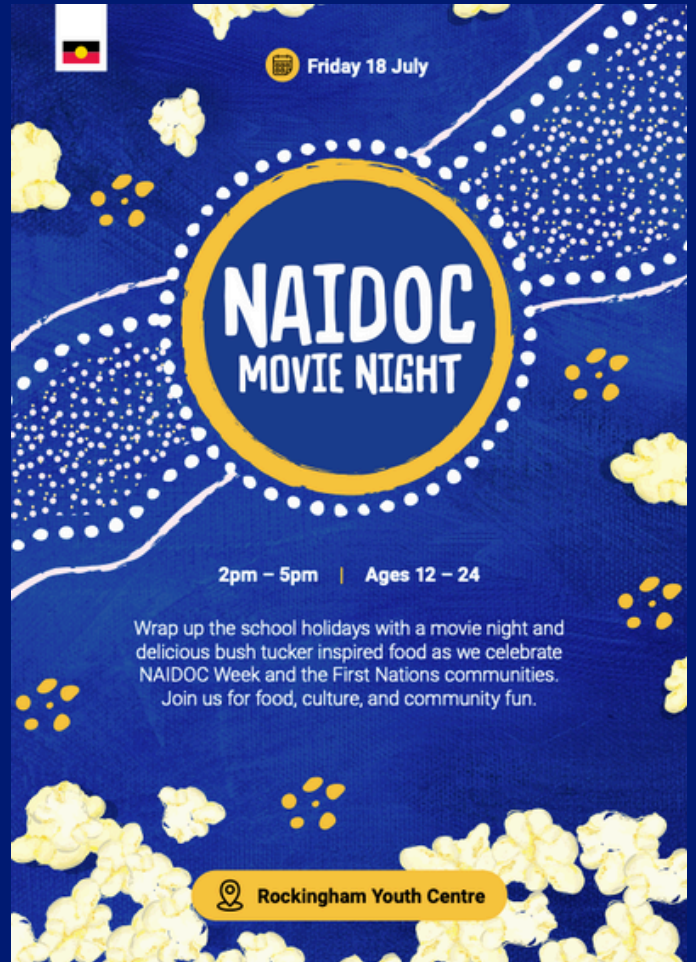
